Both businesses are based at the Mushroom Works Studios in Newcastle upon Tyne.

Ingrid's artwork has been featured in many regional publications including Culture magazine, Concept for Living, Living North, the Journal & Chronicle, North East Exclusive and the House Hunter. Nationally, she has appeared in Real

Homes magazine, Craftsman and Selvedge.

She has a strong interest in education, enterprise and developing the creative in an individual. TEXTILES

Big Knit Workshop Schools

Code BKSC



Big Knitting is a new and exciting method of knitting using multiple strands of coloured fibre and/or fabric simultaneously. In a short space of time, it can produce big single pieces of quality which have the potential to be used as much in home furnishings as they could be in the fashion industry.

No sewing is involved. There are no complicated stitches to learn. Students will only need to know/learn how to cast on and off, and knit in garter and stocking stitch. The emphasis in this workshop is not on stitch type, but on the introduction to the creative use of a new technique.

Big Knitting is fun, fast and will open your students' eyes to a new image for handknitting and its use of new tools and materials.

This one day workshop will introduce your students to:

- A contemporary & very different approach to a traditional craft
- New tools and techniques e.g. needle lengths on a 1 day workshop are 400mm and 600mm
- The creative use and handling of multiple strands of fibre and fabric

The workshop will introduce or heighten awareness of:

- Colour and tonal values (in multiple strand knitting)

and will encourage:

- A creative approach to the use of alternative materials
- An appreciation of the use & origin of natural fibres (wool & cotton)
- New approaches to the design & making of a piece of fabric

Length of time: Whole day workshop

Cost: £200 plus expenses (materials & travelling)

Please note that on this workshop, a materials cost per student of £5 will be applicable, to cover fibre use. Two sizes of needle will be available for the students to try out during the workshop. These will also be available for them to buy at the end of the day, if they would like to do this. Alternatively, the school might also want to invest in pairs for future use.

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TEXTILES

Rug Tufting Workshop

Code RTS



Rug Tufting is an industrial technique used to create rugs and wallcoverings for the domestic & corporate interior. The rug tufting gun is driven by compressed air and electricity and fires fibre through a polyester & nylon canvas. A blade automatically cuts the tufts to a length dictated by the interchangeable steel needle. The tufts are held in place at the finish of the work by latex, an industrial glue, and the work is backed by hessian.

Workshops take place in Ingrid's studio at the Mushroom Works. The studio is equipped with a 4m x 4m frame bolted to the studio floor. There are two rug tufting guns and a selection of coloured fibres available for use.

The workshop will involve the following;

- Preparation for design: from sketchbook to canvas
- Practical preparation for rug tufting: stretching the canvas onto a smaller frame for insertion into fixed frame
- How the rug tufting gun works. Includes:
 - a) technical specifications
 - b) air compressor
 - c) operation of gun
- Practical demonstration and teaching of industrial rug tufting techniques
- Use of colour in gun tufting
- Fibre construction and the importance of fibre knowledge in textile construction
- Finishing techniques



The students will be able to take a finished piece of work away.

Length of time: Whole day workshop or equivalent student time over one week can be negotiated

No. of students: 2 per workshop or over negotiated time during one week

Cost: £85 per student including materials cost

Sketchbook Development Workshop

Code SKD



Ingrid Wagner has travelled the world. From Russia to Morocco, her experiences are reflected in her fascinating collection of sketchbooks which accompany her everywhere on her travels. She works with a variety of materials.

Ingrid's striking and colourful rugs, wallcoverings and multimedia paintings, created in her studio at the Mushroom Works, Newcastle, all have their origin in Ingrid's sketchbooks. She is also a talented photographer, but understands the difference between thinking through drawing and recording what she sees through a lens.

The aim of the workshop is to free up the students' thinking and help them to see that an individual approach to sketchbook development is valuable.

The students will have the opportunity to:

- See a selection of Ingrid's sketchbooks & hear about how she records on her travels
- View some of the larger works which have grown from this essential beginning & trace their evolution
- React to and discuss what they see
- Undertake practical exercises in developing an idea in a specially created sketchbook
- Make use of a variety of materials to interpret one idea

The students will also be able to:

- Examine their own ways of working. This will involve looking at and commenting on their own and each other's sketchbooks
- Discuss the importance of drawing and/or the use of a camera for recording an image

Length of time: Morning or afternoon session, lasting approximately 2.5 hours

Weaving & Collage Workshop (primary upwards)

Code WCS



Ingrid's professional training is in Textile Design, using pattern and collage techniques and weaving. Colour is a focal point in Ingrid's work and its use is particularly appropriate for these workshops.

Ingrid's interest in history and culture, together with her storytelling skills additionally offer your students the opportunity of learning while creating. Any project undertaken can be linked to an educational subject appropriate to the learning ages of your students. Guidance will be given at each stage of the project.

The workshops can be provided for Primary School ages upwards. They are fun and creative and, above all, they encourage your students to use their imagination. Please note that the examples given below can be adapted or changed according to the requirements of your students.

1) Collage & colour

Project A example. Students will have the opportunity to:

- Create a large textile book with several pages standing 1 metre high
- Use a variety of materials to build up subject matter i.e. paint, fabric
- Use their imagination in contributing to the interpretation of an overall story or subject i.e. Spring, or stories of ancient or contemporary travellers
- Work in groups and negotiate their place within the group

Project B example. Students will have the opportunity to:

- Use Matisse as inspiration
- Create cutouts focusing on different forms & colours
- Apply cutouts to their own design on a pre-cut shape
- Work in groups and discover their own creative approach to design

2) Weaving & colour

Students will have the opportunity to:

- Create large or small individual wallhangings using basic weaving techniques
- Make use of a wide variety of materials, including recycled
- Become aware of colour relationships
- Work in pairs & in groups to create an overall design
- Realise the importance of their own contribution to the group
- Understand their individual creative approach



Length of time: Morning or afternoon session, lasting approximately 2.5 hours
Whole day, structured around students' needs

Cost: £100 half day session plus expenses (materials & traveling)
£200 whole day session plus expenses (materials & travelling)

Arts & Business Workshop

Code ABS



This interactive group workshop for your students can be tailored to the requirements of your particular group. Ingrid's approach encourages active participation and questions throughout. She has many stories to tell about her travel adventures and how they have contributed to both her businesses.

Emphasis in this workshop will be placed on the arts. The workshop can take place either at the Mushroom Works using Ingrid's

studio and the MW gallery, or at your school.



Example topics might include:

- Introduction to Ingrid Wagner Rug & Art Creation
- How are the textiles made? Techniques employed/equipment used
- Can an artist go into business? What's different about a creative business?
- Background to Ingrid's business start up – stories from living & working in Russia, traveling through Morocco, setting up business & studio in Newcastle
- First failure – how to get up afterwards and keep going
- How much does each textile cost to make – why the finances are important
- How much time is there in one day – why self organisation is essential
- What are you like? Personal qualities needed to run a successful creative business

Length of time: Morning or afternoon session, lasting approximately 2.5 hours

What can an International Arts, Culture and Enterprise programme do for your young people and for your school?



Widening horizons and developing young people's aspirations is a core part of our International programme. Taking young people out of their usual environment and introducing them to **a new experience**, socially, culturally and economically, will challenge them.

Real World Journey's trips provide a safe and secure environment within which your young people can face these challenges and out of which

they can grow as a result. We work with an experienced on the ground team in Morocco to make this happen.

A Global Dimension – Linking to your curriculum

The **International Arts, Culture & Enterprise** programme gives you the opportunity to integrate the **global dimension** into your curriculum. Key concepts include global citizenship, diversity, interdependence, social justice, sustainable development and values & perceptions. The programme aims to **raise your young people's awareness of another culture** and enable them to begin to understand and appreciate life from a different perspective. It is seen as a valuable part of your students' personal development. It is also something which they are unlikely to experience on their own initiative. It further aims to:

- Develop enterprise and employability skills of post 16 students in preparation for their progression into the workplace or to start up in business
- Encourage entrepreneurial thinking
- Promote the use of creativity and imagination
- Facilitate personal development & learning

You can work with Ingrid to develop a programme specific to your students' needs. This may be:

(1) **Enterprise & Culture**

Your students will have the opportunity to:

- **See how enterprise works in another country** through observation of daily working life both in mountain and city communities
- **Listen to** Moroccan people who have developed their own businesses
- **Visit artisan workshops** and learn some of the techniques employed
- **Take part in** a programme which delivers enterprise training pre & post trip. Part of this training can support the start up of a social



enterprise business within your school, linked to the trip abroad.

We work with Enterprise agencies, such as Enterprising Newcastle, to deliver this programme. The programme also prepares your students for their new experiences in Morocco.

(2) **Arts & Culture – base: Marrakech**

The art & design focus of this trip will:

- Contribute to the students' artistic practice
- Widen their awareness of art & design practices in non-European countries
- Introduce them to new ways of working
- Give the students a real world, real time experience which can be linked to the project/s already begun at college

Your students will have the opportunity to **undergo training in specific skill areas of Moroccan craftwork, according to their particular disciplines** i.e.



textiles, interior design techniques, mosaics, calligraphy, shoemaking (a full list is available on request)



led by fully vetted masters in their craft. Students will also be able to visit stunning examples of Islamic architecture to develop their sketchbook work.

Back up information on the arts & culture of Morocco will be supplied to your students both pre and during the trip itself, to enable them to benefit to the full from their experience

Rich in its cultural heritage, artisan workers and design development, Morocco's skill base is a rich resource for learning & training for your students. The country also offers the experience of a very different culture, giving your students the chance to gain an insight into another way of life among what must be one of the most hospitable peoples in the world. At its heart, the Moroccan culture is also enterprising. Here there are no government grants or funds to support a business, and Moroccans generally develop their enterprising skills on their own initiatives, driven both by need and opportunity. On this basis alone, the country offers a different experience to learn from.
